Item	Notes and Decisions	Action
1.	Apologies were received for: Aidan Dunn, Cllr Drew Mellor and Liz Williams.	
	CB mentioned she had attended the Integrated Care Partnership meeting for Dorset and that she pointed out there was the existing Skills Advisory Board and Board that could be used for the health and social care in Dorset and the LEP could bring a business voice to that table.	
	CB welcomed Julia Howe to her first Board meeting.	
	Declarations of Interest: there were no additional conflicts of interest declared.	
2.	Guest Presentations	
2.1	Options for a Dorset Economic, Labour Market and Social Insight Programme (Confidential)	
	The Chair introduced the item, with a reminder that the rationale for developing our data and insight function had been agreed in the delivery plan as fundamental to creating compelling strategic economic plans for Dorset and our wider geographies.	
	Mike Spicer (MS) and David Marlow (DM) were commissioned to look at the opportunity of doing this work	
	MS explained that he and DM are economic development consultants with a lot of experience of insight functions. They recommended Dorset LEP invest in an insight function as it can provide economic evidence to underpin decisions and access additional investment	
	DM explained that Research England often funds the translation end of research rather than the typical research universities undertake. He ran through some examples of insight functions in other areas and explained that these functions change and develop over time.	
	A number of Board members and stakeholders had been interviewed as part of the process and there is an appetite for an insight function for Dorset and a rationale for it to be hosted by the LEP.	
	TF said he thought it seemed a sensible idea but he was not clear of the ask of the local authorities as part of the agenda item.	
	VN explained that she had run the South West Observatory, which was basically a larger version of what was being talked about. She confirmed the value of evidence for informing policy. She went on to say that the best investment they made was in the website as a one-stop portal to signposting and translation of existing data about and from the area.	
	PG spoke about Dorset having strong civic universities working across the region and that this compliments what is being talked about.	
	JA agreed and said that himself, VN and PG should get together to work out how to access the funding available from Research England and how that can benefit the region.

2.1	Options for a Dorset Economic, Labour Market and Social Insight Programme Cont'd (Confidential - Commercially Sensitive)	
	JB said he was not quite sure of what it is local authorities are being asked to sign up to and what is being asked of them.	
	CB explained that we started looking at an insight function when we were talking about the new function of LEPs and the delivery plan. The presentation today is a piece of research commissioned by the LEP investigating how others operate - to give us recommendations for establishing our own approach	
	SF commented that everyone was looking for more economic growth in Dorset and that we should be looking for significant funding. If you look around the country, some of more successful LEPs have gone for large amounts of money for significant infrastructure.	
	PR said that if there was something that businesses were able to use to utilise data to help inform decisions it needs to make would be beneficial.	
	CL informed that a lot of what is being said sounded very familiar from the Government's perspective. When reviewing any application for funding or support, the areas that they can best advocate for are the ones that have data and insight to support their business case".	
	Action: all approved the recommendations and to take forward the discussions on what type of areas should be prioritised further.	
2.2	Board Governance Review and Dorset Business Council	
	The Dorset LEP Board has discussed, as part of the delivery planning process, a range of implications for future governance, from the National LEP Review, including revised core funding for LEPs and objectives outlined in the Levelling Up White paper concerning future government investment and priorities for local devolution. These considerations highlighted the need for a refreshed governance structure for Dorset LEP which, following Board approval, was initiated from June 2022.	
	SR presented the latest proposed changes to the governance structure, based on information from conversations with government representatives, other LEPs and our Local Authorities. The recommended refinements are based on principles outlined previously at the March and May Board meetings.	
	The proposal as described in the agreed budget and delivery plan, is to create a streamlined governance structure with a slimmed down Board supported by a "business council" (working title for a refreshed ambassadors' group). The proposed approach is more governance light, with a reduced team and is consistent with the vision already agreed. It takes more of a 'task and finish', agile approach, getting the right people around the table for specific tasks.	
	The LEP Board will continue to have oversight of the strategy and corporate health of the company.	
	Dorset Council is planning to review of the governance of the Enterprise Zone and the LEP will be working closely with them on this.

2.2	Board Governance Review and Dorset Business Council Cont'd	
	SR ran through the proposed next steps and a possible new structure as outlined in the paper. It was agreed that the term "business council" was not appropriate and could be confusing.	
	It was noted that there was no indication of changed government policy towards LEPs at the moment.	
	It was noted that as Directors of a Community Interest Company, the Board have a responsibility to ensure that the company's governance structure is fit for purpose and to update the Articles of Association accordingly.	
	Action: all approved the following:	
	 Further discussion with the Councils will take place to ensure maximum impact through strategic and operational alignment. 	
	 Further work will be done in October 22 to develop the business ambassador/business "forum" concept 	
	 A LEP Board skills audit and review commencing in November 2022 and aligned to forthcoming Board 'away day'. 	
	 A revised structure would be gradually put in place with completion in Q1, 2023 – under the leadership of the new Dorset LEP Executive Director. 	
2.3	A303 Update	
	CB gave an overview of the background and current A303 proposal from Highways England and said that this debate has been going well over ten years. She emphasised the independent analysis that had been undertaken to show benefits of the works to Dorset. She asked whether Dorset LEP is willing to sign an open letter to the Secretary of State in support of the scheme along with the other relevant LEPs.	
	A discussion took place and it was agreed the Board was happy to support.	
	LR left the meeting at 1455	
	Action: all agreed happy to support and sign an open letter to the Secretary of State.	
2.4	Weymouth College update	
	Julia Howe gave a presentation on Weymouth College. She reminded the Board that in 2013 the College went into Administration. She joined in 2014 and joined the leadership team put in place to help move the College forward. In 2015 and 2020 the College received a 'good' status from Ofsted. She informed that the College is now in a financial health position of 'good' which has resulted in the DfE, funding agencies and further education commissioner's team taking the College out of financial intervention. This will allow the college to access more funding opportunities in the future. She ran through their strategic plan and projects currently engaged with.	
	JA stated it was good to hear the progress of the College and that it was an important college for the Weymouth and Portland area.
