

Developing an ambitious Local Industrial Strategy for Dorset

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The Government's National Industrial Strategy sets out longterm economic and investment priorities for the UK. It aims to boost productivity by helping businesses create good jobs and increase wages with investment in skills, industries and infrastructure. In December 2018 the Government asked Dorset Local Enterprise Partnership to help deliver this strategy by developing a Local Industrial Strategy (LIS) for Dorset.

Working in close collaboration with local businesses, organisations, BCP Council and Dorset Council, Dorset's LIS will be a twenty-year plan to increase productivity, innovation, earnings and well-being across the county, delivering on an ambition to create a local economy that is sustainable, innovative, resilient and inclusive.

The opportunity

Technology advancements are transforming the way we live and work, especially in more rural areas like Dorset. This 'new industrial revolution' will see government and businesses working together to shape a stronger, more inclusive economy.

Dorset is an outstanding place to live, work and do business. Our Local Industrial Strategy will unlock post-Brexit opportunities, deliver ambitious investment plans, inject growth and prosperity in to the business community and improve the auality of life for all.



Progress to date

Over the last two years, Dorset LEP has produced a series of economic reports and visionary documents which tell the story of Dorset's economic successes, specific challenges and ambitions to date alongside steps needed to boost our productivity and increase our contribution to UK plc. Written in collaboration with the private and public sector, they collectively provide a solid foundation for developing our Local Industrial Strategy.


Over the past four months we have grown our evidence base through submissions from a range of local economic development stakeholders in the public, private and voluntary sectors. This has included data sets, research papers, surveys and strategies highlighting the importance of innovation, future growth of industries, technologies and skills

And last month we held public consultation events across the county enabling businesses and stakeholders to input and influence the development of Dorset's LIS. As we develop our emerging thinking, we will continue to test this with businesses and other partners during 2019.


- Pursuing better virtual and real communications

Dorset has a robust economy worth £17 billion per year, backed by impressive employment levels and high business survival rates. Home to multi-national corporations and fast growth local enterprises, its 47,000+ businesses support 342,000 jobs across a region equal in size to Bristol. With burgeoning high-growth sectors, an established industrial base, two new streamlined councils and a world-class coastline, countryside and maritime environment, Dorset has immense economic potential and an exciting future.





POSITIVE FACTS ABOUT OUR ECONOMY

- 4% average growth rate p.a. in Bournemouth and Poole between 2012-2017 compared to 3.6% across UK
- Employment in creative industries up 15% over last 2 years
- Bournemouth produces 3.8 tonnes of CO² per capita compared to 5 tonnes per capita in other urban areas
- Bournemouth's financial and insurance activities are 2.5 times greater than the 'average' UK profile
- Dorset's environmental economy is worth around £1.5bn p.a.
 equivalent to 8%-10% of the overall economy



BUT THERE IS MORE WORK TO DO TO IMPROVE OUR ECONOMY

- Almost ¹/3 of job vacancies are due to skills shortages
- Dorset Council area has UK's lowest home ownership for 24-35 year olds - just 15.8% are homeowners
- Weymouth and Portland 322nd out of 324 local authority areas for social mobility
- Dorset's hourly GVA is £29.20 compared to £33.60 UK average indicating differential output gap of £2.5bn p.a
- Average house price in Christchurch and East Dorset is 13x average annual salary of those who live there



WE HAVE SOME UNIQUE ASPECTS TO BE HARNESSED AS REAL OPPORTUNITIES

- Two-thirds of Dorset is covered by either environmental designations or rated as high-risk of flooding
- In 2017, Dorset achieved average unemployment rates of 2.9%, compared with 4.4% equivalent UK average
- 28.6% of Dorset's population are over 65 - the highest proportion of any UK county (average is 18%)
- By 2029 in Dorset there will be almost 1 person of state pension for every person of working age
- By 2025, 39% of Dorset's population is expected to be over 60 compared to 23% in England

Current position and next steps

This paper is based on detailed data analysis and extensive dialogue with local stakeholders and partners. The resulting emerging priorities introduced in this text, which are distinct to Dorset and could make a specific contribution to the UK economy, are still evolving. This is not our final economic proposition for Dorset. Prior to writing the Local Industrial Strategy, we welcome your views on Dorset's economy and the approach detailed here to help further identify our local and very specific competitive advantages and opportunities.

We hope that the emerging themes in this document resonate with you and inspire you to engage with us and contribute to the development of Dorset's Local Industrial Strategy.
